RE: Interim Committee Report – Week of December 12, 2016

General Information

This is the first report of the 2017 Legislative Session. As I have done in the past, a report summarizing any action will be provided by Friday of an interim committee week and each Friday during the regular legislative session. I will also provide pertinent information during the week if necessary as things move fast during session. I have included the important legislative dates in this report.

Legislative committee chairs and committee memberships have been released. Committees impacting education including chairs and members are listed at the end of this report.

Last week the House held training for new members and did not hold committee meetings.

The Senate held the first set of interim committee meetings this week. Most of the committees meetings consisted of introductions of members and staff and briefings on major issues. Relevant information is summarized below.

Senate Education Committee

The Senate Education Committee met for the first time this week. The committee's jurisdiction includes all issues related to education. There were a series of presentations on higher education. No significant K-12 issues were discussed.

Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on PreK-12 Education

Chair Simmons outlined the committee budget priorities. Then, Tim Elwell, the staff director, reviewed the committee's jurisdiction and major issues. Senator Simmons expressed continued concern over the amount of testing and the cost and waste of such testing. He emphasized that the cost and inefficiency included both the cost of the assessments themselves and lost instructional time for students. He indicated that the first committee meeting in January would be devoted to this issue. He also mentioned that the committee would be looking closely at the budget for reallocations from programs/areas that are not working to those that do increase student performance. He is particularly

interested in teacher pay. Finally, extending the school day through serving the lowest 300 elementary schools was also discussed. There will be another meeting devoted to this program and a discussion of programs that are not working and why.

Senate Appropriations Committee

After introductions of staff, the committee had an update on Florida's Long-Range Financial Outlook from Amy Baker with Economic and Demographic Research. Below are the major points made during her presentation.

- The economy is recovering but the drags, particularly construction, are more persistent than past events, but the strength in tourism is largely compensation for this. Overall, it will take another year to climb completely out of the hole left by the recession.
- When the Long-Range Financial Outlook was adopted in September, a projected remaining General Revenue balance of \$1.41 billion in nonrecurring dollars was assumed to be available for use in the 2017-18 Fiscal Year. Taking into account new revenue forecasts and adjustments for budget amendments, this amount has increased by \$70.4 million.
- Critical Needs are those budget items that are mandatory increases based on estimating conferences and other essential items. Of the Critical Needs, the Medicaid Program dominates. Over the three-year period covered in the Long-Range Outlook, the additional Medicaid need each year consumes an average of 53.0% of the expected General Revenue growth for that year.
- The most recent PreK-12 Enrollment Estimating Conference indicated that while the number of FTEs is growing strongly, the number of projected FTEs was reduced by approximately one-half of one percent per year.
- Ad Valorem. Taxable value increased, but the impact on the budget is unknown due to policy changes in the budget for the 2016-2017 Fiscal Year. During the 2016 Session, the Legislature made the policy decision to hold the Required Local Effort (RLE) to the 2015-2016 level. Normally, the Long-Range Financial Outlook assumes that the current year's certified millage rate is the starting point for projected expenditures in the subsequent year. The statewide average millage rate was 4.638 on July 15, 2016 for the 2016-2017 Fiscal Year. This was used in the projections, allowing projected taxable value increases to feed through the plan. The Legislature may not agree, and may instead choose to hold the level flat again. To hold the level flat would require an additional infusion of General Revenue funds. See chart below for additional amounts needed if the RLE remains the same and is not based on the millage rate.

Overall there is no budget gap in the first year of the Long-Range Financial Outlook, but there is
essentially no remaining General Revenue for discretionary issues. Furthermore, the projected
recurring expenditures and revenue adjustments, in combination, outstrip the available
recurring resources.

- For the first time since the 2010 Outlook, there is a projected budget gap, or potential shortfall between revenues and expenditures during the three-year period.
- The 2018-19 and 2019-20 Fiscal Years both show projected budget needs significantly in excess of available revenue for critical and other high priority needs. The shortfalls are even greater when factoring in the potential revenue adjustments.
- Since the increase in projected recurring expenditures in the 2017-2018 Fiscal Year clearly contributes to and worsens the problems in the 2018-19 and 2019-20 Fiscal Years, fiscal strategies are advisable for all three years in order to manage the problems of the out-years.
- The Outlook does not make assumptions regarding future legislative policy decisions. Some significant policy decisions with spending implications have yet to be made:
 - Florida Statutes established the Triumph Gulf Coast, Inc. and the Recovery Fund for the benefit of disproportionately affected counties by the Deepwater Horizon Disaster. If the Legislature places 75% of the funds recovered in the 2016-17 Fiscal Year (.75 x \$400 million) into the fund, that \$300 million would be a reduction in the funds otherwise assumed to be available.
 - A decision to hold the RLE flat would have an even greater effect (-\$400 million)
 - A decision to ratify a new Indian Gaming Compact, depending on the provisions of the implementing legislation, would likely add revenue.
